<p>Correct: Babe Ruth set the home-run record, and he entertained fans of all ages.</p>	<p>Correct: Al Capone used violent tactics to control Chicago. He would annihilate any competition.</p>
<p>Separate into 2 sentences. Use a semicolon for closely related sentences. Use a comma with a conjunction (for, and, but, or yet, so).</p>	<p>Separate into 2 sentences. Change to a semicolon. Add a conjunction after the comma (for, and, but, so, or, yet)</p>

Adding Transitions

Compare/Contrast	As opposed, Conversely, Even though, Nevertheless, On the contrary, Whereas, However, Despite
Adding/Conclusion	Additionally, All things considered, All-in-all, Consequently, For this reason, Furthermore, In other words, In short, Moreover, Therefore, Thus, Undoubtedly
Emphasis/Repetition	Certainly, Naturally, Thus, To Clarify, In particular, For instance
Time	Afterward, At this point, Prior to, Formerly, Meanwhile, While,
Reason, Condition, and Result	Accordingly, Admittedly, Inevitably, On account of, Provided that, On account of, Hence, Consequently

Varying Sentence Beginnings

Begin with an adjective.	Sad about being home all day, women sought new freedoms.
Begin with an adverb	Regretfully, the Stock Market crashed in 1929.
Begin with an “ing” participial phrase.	Muttering to herself, the young girl vowed to move to the city.
Begin with an “ed” participial phrase.	Angered by the long wait, Amelia Earhart fought for women’s rights to change.
Start with a transitional phrase.	Finally, Capone used corrupt politicians and law officials to keep control of his empire.
Begin the sentence with an appositive phrase.	A disobedient child, Capone got into trouble at an early age.

Extended Imagery/Metaphors

Examples	Try to weave in and incorporate words related to your topic.
Water Imagery (Prohibition)	Bubbled over, Boiled over, Overflowed, Splash, Wave,
Fashion Imagery (Flappers, Fashion)	Restitched, Sewed, Hemmed, Fabric, Cut apart, Weaved,
Weaponry (Capone. Crime)	Triggered, Explosive, Shot, Bullet, Ticking,
Flame	Spark, Spread, Contagious, Extinguish, Fed,
Aviation	Soared above, New heights, Runway, Skyrocketed,
Transportation	Revved up, Fast Lane, Changing Gears, Signaled, Brakes

Works Consulted Reminders

Did you include the proper heading (Works Consulted title should be centered)?

Reread your paper backward to catch errors in spelling, punctuation, and mechanics.
